

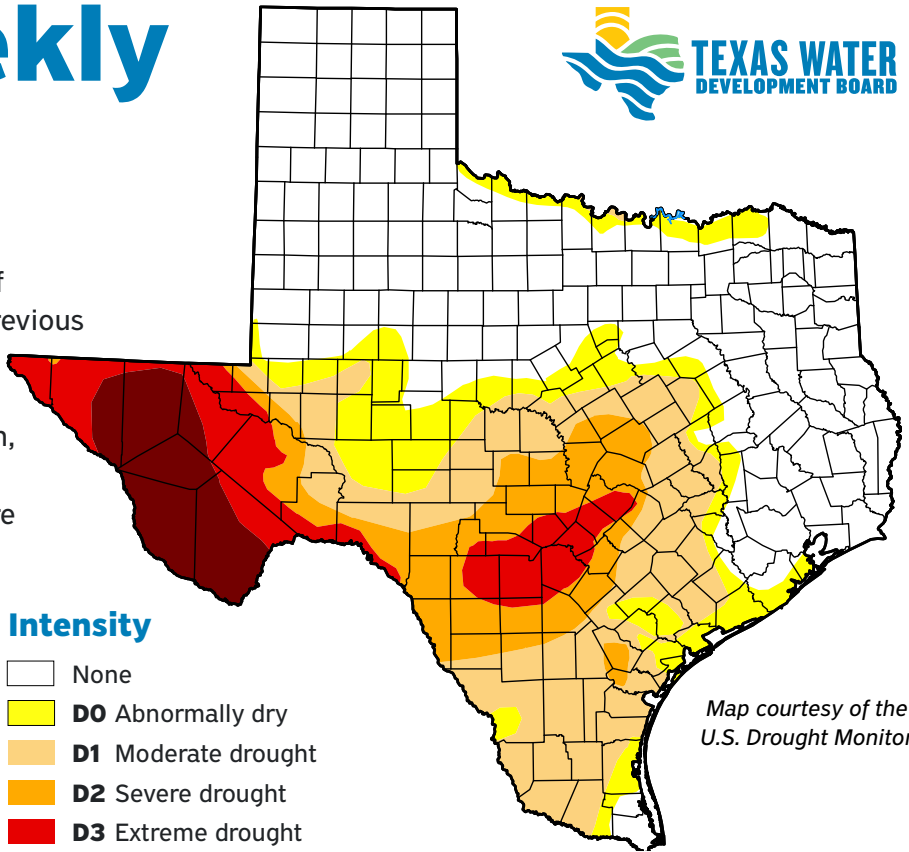

Water conditions

The latest drought map for conditions as of January 21 shows little change from the previous week. January is historically Texas' driest month, which encourages drought expansion — but it's also the coolest month, which discourages expansion. On average, changes in drought area during January are less than a percentage point.



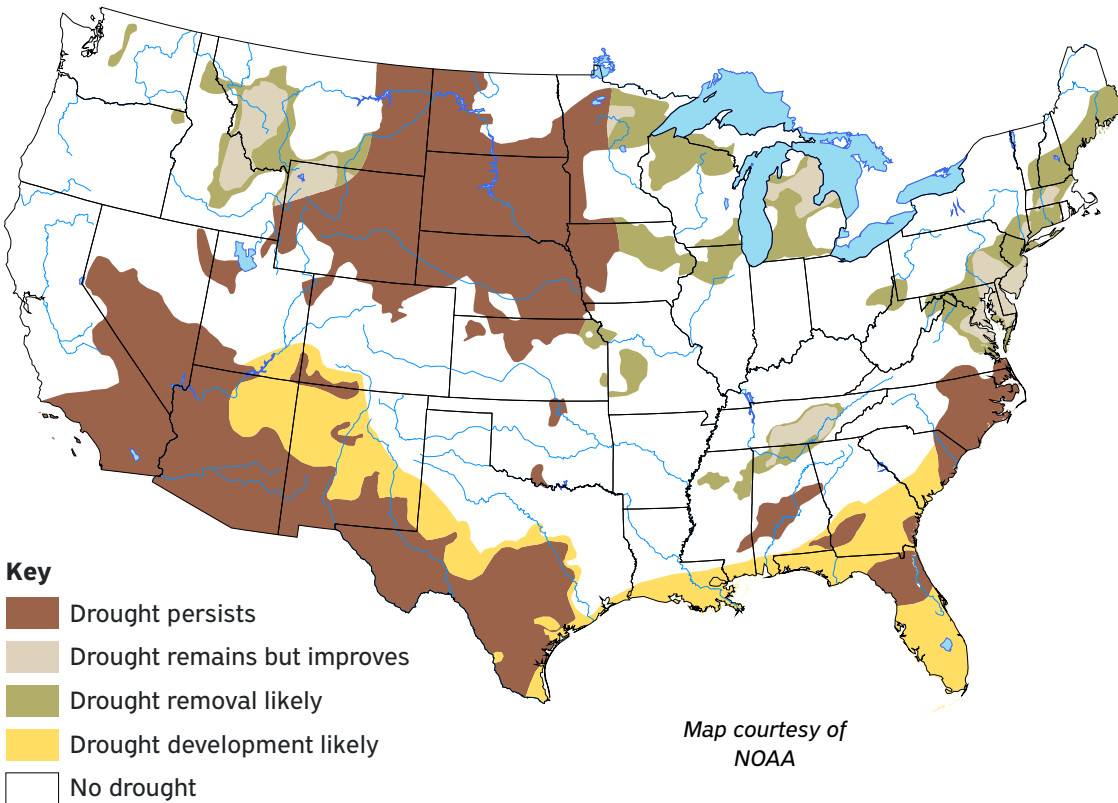

U.S. seasonal drought outlook

The National Weather Service anticipates drought expansion in Texas by the end of April. But most of the Panhandle and North Texas are expected to remain drought free. And areas of East Texas which were recently designated drought free are also expected to avoid the return of drought.

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
